Re-opening Announcement

The University Art Museum of Tokyo University of the Arts was closed temporarily to limit the spread of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19). Following the lifting of the request by the Japanese and Tokyo metropolitan governments for the temporary closure of museums and galleries, the Museum reopens on Tuesday, June 1, 2021. Prior to your visit to the Museum, please read the following information.

- An alert will be posted on the museum website if a museum visitor or staff member has been confirmed to be infected with Covid-19.
Please keep a record of your visit day/time in case such information is needed. If you have visited on the day in question, please contact your nearest local government help desk for advice.

Our Requests to Visitors

- Please do not visit if any of the following conditions apply:
 - You have cold or flu symptoms such as a fever (37.5 degrees C or above), cough, loss of taste/smell, or if you are not feeling well.
 - If you have been in close contact with a Covid-19 infected person, or are yourself within the health observation time period following such contact or travel from a country with elevated Covid-19 infection rates.
- Please be aware of and observe the following counter-measures:
 - Visitor's temperatures will be taken upon arrival at the museum. All visitors whose temperature is higher than 37.5 degrees C are requested to refrain from entering the museum.
 - Anyone who has a strong cough or other cold-like symptoms may be asked to leave.
 - You are required to wear a mask or face covering to enter the museum.
 - Please take care to wash and sanitize your hands.
 - Please keep your distance from other visitors.
 - The number of passengers allowed in the elevator are limited. You may be asked to wait when the elevator is full.
 - Please refrain from talking in the galleries.
 - Please do not touch the artworks, display cases, equipment or walls with your hands.
 - When crowded, admission to the exhibitions may be limited, and visitors may be asked to wait for a while before entering each building.

Measures Being Taken at the Exhibition

- Monitoring visitor's temperatures at the entrance
- Availability of sanitizers throughout the museum.
- Disinfection, cleaning and filtered air circulation in the building.
- All staff, contractors and others who enter the building have regular temperature and health checks.
- Staff members all wear masks, acrylic barriers have been installed and other methods are being used at visitor-facing areas to prevent the aerosol spread of the virus.
- Rest area chairs and other facilities have been rearranged to allow for social distancing and to prevent face-to-face positioning.
- Admission to the exhibitions may be limited to avoid the "Three Cs"--Closed spaces, Crowded places, Close-contact settings.
